From the Director's Chair...

This is my last missive as I retire two months from today. I think back on how I started reading at age three, and by four, I was correcting Dad's mistakes as he read aloud to me. Naturally, I spent many hours in the library. As I aged, times changed - following school, or walking home from the beach covered in sand, dragging my skateboard (we called them sidewalk surfboards then), then doing homework at the front table of the library with my best friend. I was always hauling more books home. I watch children today doing essentially the same thing - only, they have backpacks and I think, "Oh, how many more books I could have carried with a backpack!"

I remember shelving in the high school library, then working the summer inventorying the collection. Since then, I have always worked in libraries, first in college and grad school, then on the coast, after which I landed a job as a library director in Washington County. It was there that I first encountered computers. We had the awesome job of converting all those card catalogs to MARC (MAchine Readable Cataloging), our first experience with the clunky, big computers housed in a huge area. Oh, how the libraries have changed. From clunky card catalogs and manual typewriters and no interlibrary loans to fast computers, the ability to download what you need, as well as order material from anywhere in the world.

That first directorship was interrupted one day by an extremely forward-thinking City Manager who walked in and said "Ladies, I'm going to send you to school." We both looked at him and said huh? The problem with volunteer fire departments and daytime is that most of people were working out of town and there was nobody to respond to the calls. The library was housed in City Hall with the Fire Department and Police Departments. Therefore, we took training to become Emergency Medical Technicians and Fire Fighters. It turned out to be a real blessing. The people knew us, so when we came upon a scene they were not afraid, because they already trusted us. It was a genius combination and it worked well for everyone. Librarians are naturally helpful and caring and are used to saving lives - "You've been dying for the new Patterson, it's in for you." Saved a life! "You can't make it to work because your car broke down - let me help you find what you need in the Chilton's Manual. " "Your doctor prescribed what? Here - let us look up the side effects. " "You think your child is on drugs? Let's get you some material to help you decide before you take the next step." Sometimes just chatting with a patron in the library can be lifesaving. When I took books to homes as the outbound librarian, I was the only other person one woman saw except for the mailman, her niece who brought her groceries twice a month, and the meter reader. I got her hooked up with "Meals on Wheels" and some home nursing visits. I also found her a ride to the senior center. Lifesaving! Libraries change with technology, but the caring side has never faltered. Read some of the books about librarians on horseback delivering to mountain communities, or on elephants in some countries. We may computerize, but we are still humans who care.

When I first arrived as director of the Bandon Public Library, we had doors that flew off into the parking lot or didn't work at all, bad lighting, and we won't even talk about the Sprague room floor. Now it's almost six years later and we have wonderful doors – which open when you walk up with your *Continued on Page 3*
