



## From the Director's Desk...

Hello out there, all you wonderful friends of the library! I hope that you are all continuing to weather this pandemic in a safe and healthy way. I have been your director for a year now, and sadly still haven't had the




opportunity to meet or visit with many of you. I realize that having your beloved library closed during this time, and an unfamiliar person managing things, can add discomfort and apprehension for many of you. It was expressed to me that I might be able to increase confidence by explaining to all of you what my vision for the library is. That is a difficult task for me because I believe strongly that this shouldn't be about my vision. This library doesn't actually belong to me, it belongs to you. First and foremost, the library needs to be useful to the community which has entrusted me to run it.

It was my intention upon my arrival to spend my first year getting to know our community and its needs, in order to form library policy and practices to be most responsive to those needs. The pandemic we are all living through has made this task much more difficult and less direct, but not impossible. I rely on statistical information, both external and internal, and our staff's expertise to tell me what kinds of programs, services, and library materials our community is interested in, and to show me where our library funds are best invested. I like to try new things all the time and see how they go, but if an item doesn't circulate, or if the programs I plan aren't attended (even virtual ones), I quickly move on to try something else. This means that the best way to tell me you like something is to use it, and the best way to tell me you don't is to ignore it. Of course, I also welcome individual suggestions and input. If you request an item be added to our collection--and I can get it--I almost always will.

Public libraries have certainly evolved, but their core purpose remains intact. Libraries exist to provide access to needed/desired information for their communities. I look to you to make known to me the type of information you want, and what form it should take.

## Library Readers Book Club



### Digital Editions at www.bandonlibrary.org

One of the hardest things about this pandemic for the staff and me, is your absence from our library. We were musing the other day about how much we enjoyed it when you would simply come in to read the newspaper, or other magazines. Often you wouldn't even check them out, but just find a nice comfy spot in one of our chairs, or at one of our tables, and read the paper. We thought that you, too, might be missing out on this simple pleasure, so we began to conceptualize a way to bring it back, virtually, during this time.

Using remaining CARES grant funds and what was left in our periodicals budget (we paused subscriptions since there was no one coming in to read), we decided to create a portal on our website at **www.bandonlibrary.org**, which you can use to access newspapers and magazines from home, using a computer or a mobile device, and so Digital Editions was brought to life.

As I write this, we're still working on set-up, but we should be live by the time this goes to print. Visit us online, and check it out!

Who knew three years ago the BLFF wouldn't be able to hold regular book sales and the Never Ending Book Sale would be unavailable as long as the library had to be closed. This has made our Lifetime Members Club an important fundraiser for the BLFF and the library. In the past two years the LTMC raised close to one regular book sale and shows promise to excel in the future.

Total donations for 2020-2021 are \$2,175.00. The three tier display table won with 14 votes. The free standing waterfall received 7 votes. Both of these were purchased and are in use.

Jennifer Croft, our director will come up with one much needed project for this October's gathering for the Bandon Public Library. The Lifetime Members will have the opportunity to choose to financially support the project. We will meet once again through emails and regular mail. Margery was devoted to the library and was a passionate reader all her life. She loved Italy, and traveled there and elsewhere in Europe frequently. An animal lover, she adopted strays that showed up at her door, and donated to various animal shelters throughout her life. When she was young, she bred horses and dogs, and was especially fond of corgis, best known as the Queen of England's favorite dogs. She was an art lover, and had a small collection of original art. As a supporter of Native American causes and their schools in particular, Margery regularly donated to them as much as she could over the years. She was a warm and generous woman, and the BLFF is extremely pleased and thankful to have been remembered in her will. In addition to those things that will help run the library, we plan to remember her in a more personal way and are looking at ideas for how to do that.
