

From the Director...

As we move into a new year, library staff have been busy working to create innovative library programs and services. With the help of grants and donations we have several new programs in the works. Recent grants and fundraising support received from the community and Bandon Library Friends and Foundation are essential in assisting with our daily operations and moving the library forward to better serve our community.

The Bandon Library Friends and Foundation Lifetime Members Club donated \$13,000 to the Bandon Library to assist with utility costs! As we wait for the implementation of a new allocation formula, assistance with funding toward daily operational expenses is greatly needed. We are so thankful for the ongoing support from the BLFF and LTMC.

Last fall, the library received the Caselle Grant and John Henry Eldred Jr. Foundation Grant which together provided \$4000 in funding toward youth programming. The BLFF received over \$8000 from 100 Strong Bandon to help purchase adult library materials all year long. We also received notice that the library will be the recipient of the Coos County Cultural Coalition Grant of \$750 towards teen art programming and the Oregon Humanities Mini Rural Grant for \$3000 toward adult storytelling programming. What wonderful opportunities these grants bring to our library!

In February, the library partnered with the Bandon Library Friends and Foundation to host a Celtic harp concert at the Sprague Theater. The concert featured musicians Aryeh Frankfurter and Lisa Lynne. We were overwhelmed with the positive attendance for the event with a full theater! Thank you BLFF for sponsoring this wonderful event!

Ongoing programs: Bandon Art Gallery exhibits, Chess Club (all age), Adult Chess Club, BLFF Book Club, preschool storytime, Washed Ashore kid's drop-in STEAM club, Washed Ashore storytime, 2 Friday Freewriting, open Apple Lab, drop-in board games sponsored by the BLFF, plastic collection, storytelling café (new), group board game time (new), Windows Computer Lab (new), High School Hangout (new), 0-5 Open Play Time (new), and an Age Café (new).

The library is partnering with the Bandon Community Garden to organize a "Seed Library" in which the community will be able to obtain free seeds at the library. We hope to have this available this spring.

In March, we will also be offering a beginning knitting workshop with Diane Sexton and a teen painting class with Vicki Affatati. In collaboration with Coastline Library Network, summer reading presentation plans include the Native American Innovation Exhibit, the Gansango Music and Dance Company, Magician Jeff Evans, Reptile Man, Journey Under the Sea, Washed Ashore youth presentation, youth art classes, and hopefully, a portable planetarium show with local NASA Solar System Ambassadors.

On February 27th, the Coos Library Board unanimously voted in favor of a new recommended library allocation formula and transition plan. The plan will be presented to the Coos County Board of Commissioners in March for review. Should it be accepted, implementation of the new formula would begin in FY24/25. The proposed new formula will create a fair and equitable means of distribution among all libraries in our county based on population and usage statistics. We are grateful for the work that has been done in this process.

As you can see, we are very excited about all the new programs and services we are planning. My hat is off to our wonderful library staff and to the community support that are instrumental in making this possible. Thank you too for all you do to help create a quality library experience for our patrons!

COMPUTER TRAINING CLASSES RESUME

Twice a month, computer labs are available for FREE at Bandon Library. The sessions are held from 4:30 to 6:00 pm in the Logan Conference Room.

A NEW offering, Windows Computer Lab, begins in March on the 2nd Tuesday. It is staffed by volunteer Larry Baker of Computers 101. (March 12, April 9, May 14 & June 11) The Apple Computer Lab is held monthly on the 2nd Wednesday of the month. Aaron Barnes of Bandon IT is the volunteer instructor. (March 13, April 10, May 8 & June 12)

Labs are drop-in sessions where you can get help with your computer questions or problems. You can bring your own Windows PC or Apple Computer to the appropriate session. Bandon Library and CyberLynx, co-sponsors of this offering, are dedicated to supporting computer literacy and training for the Bandon community. And thank you to our wonderful volunteers for providing their time and expertise.

Heavenly Harps Here at Home

It was a full-and-then-some house that greeted musicians extraordinaire Aryeh Frankfurter and Lisa Lynne at the Sprague Community Theater on February 16th. The pair of incomparable musicmakers took an appreciative (and at times roaringly enthusiastic) audience on a two-hour journey through some of the most enchanting and esoteric classical compositions that most folks had never heard.

Lest you think that because Bandon is off the beaten track and therefore of little interest to headlining musicians, consider just who these performers are:

Aryeh began classical violin training at age three. He soon took to exploring various musical genres and by age 12 was being accepted into various universitylevel orchestras. At 15, he discovered the wonders of the Celtic harp. Today, Aryeh has mastered a litany of other instruments, including the viola, mandolin and hammered dulcimer. He has released dozens of albums, toured the world and even conducted a private performance for HRH King Charles and Queen Camilla.

Musical partner and wife Lisa Lynne boasts an

equally impressive resume'. As a multi-instrumentalist and performer, she is best known internationally for the original heartwarming music that she has created on her Celtic harp, an instrument long associated with the Celtic traditions of Ireland, Scotland and Wales. She owns her own production company and recording studio, and to date her CDs have sold over 1 million copies. She is also the founder and director of "Harps for Hearts," an innovative program that places live music in numerous hospitals.

Enthralled by some of the most enchanting music ever presented at the Sprague, patrons jammed the lobby afterwards to purchase various Aryeh and Lisa CDs as keepsakes of a performance not soon forgotten.

This free concert, sponsored by the Bandon Library Friends and Foundation, is one example of the many ways the Foundation strives to support both the library and community at large. Your membership and contributions go a long way to continuing the work of the organization.
